

State, regional, county, and neighborhood-level data









Percent below Real Cost Measure by Ethnicity








Educational Attainment and Real Cost Measure The Real Cost Measure in California 2019









Percentage of Households Paying More than 30% of Income on Housing








CA GDP and Median Household Earnings The Real Cost Measure in California 2019




